

Are you as smart as these 6th graders from LaRue County Middle School?

Allison Firquin and Lauren Zahrndt (pictured below) are 6th graders at LaRue County Middle School in Hodgenville, Kentucky, and they ran our computer-based academic competition system, [Slam-In](#), all by themselves on Saturday, January 23 at the District 42 Governor's Cup Quick Recall competition at Bardstown Middle School.



Since Slam-In is computer-based, they projected their display onto a screen in the library so that everyone competing could see the score and monitor timers throughout their match:





The LaRue County Middle School team is led by Doris Jean Holleran. She chose wireless slammers for player ring-in, so there are no wires in any of her competition rooms. Our wireless slammers are each powered by 9-volt batteries - which ARE included and can last for years.

We also offer a semi-wireless Slam-In system, in case you prefer handheld buzzers. Each buzzer plugs into a wireless team transmitter, so even in this configuration, there are no wires between you and the teams that are competing.





Also, Slam-In accommodates up to 10 teams, so it's great for involving your whole team in practice sessions.

Here's what Doris Jean's wireless Slam-In system looked like in use:



When playing a Toss-Up question, her players could position their slammers wherever they were most comfortable. And when it was time for a Bonus question (which is typically a collaborative question), slammers could be moved out of the way so that it was easier for players to pass papers back and forth.

When you moderate a Slam-In match, you can simply click on buttons like "Play Question", "Right Answer", or "Wrong Answer" using your mouse. On the other hand, if you want to use your computer's keyboard, you can. All you do is press one of these buttons (and we give you stickers for each of them that you can place them on the appropriate keys for visual reference):

Keyboard Key	Slam-In Action
Spacebar 	Play Question/ Start Timer
B 	Right Answer
Backspace 	Wrong Answer
W 	Activate Time Out

As you can see, Slam-In is very easy to use, and it's also easy to transport and set up. A complete Slam-In system weighs only about 5 pounds and comes in a carrying case so small that it fits in a backpack. But don't be fooled - though Slam-In is light, it's so durable that we give you a 3-year warranty.
